Editorials

Letter from the Editor



Fall is traditionally a time of new beginnings: new schools, new friends and new projects. It's also the season when our thoughts turn more to reflection and indoor activities. As I write this, rain is pouring down, demolishing what is left of my flowers and tomatoes. A big pot of harvest vegetable soup is simmering on the stove waiting to be accompanied by

a crusty baguette. After a cold, wet spring and a summer that almost never was, autumn seems like a friend who has arrived at the party a little too early. I'm not ready yet for cold nights, short days, and grey skies. When the weather is fine, fall is my favourite season after summer – the colours are intense, the light is golden, and there is a glorious crisp scent in the air with the promise of the holiday season to come.

Food for thought

The natural beauty of our surroundings is a gift, but not one that can be taken for granted. I am increasingly aware of the number of trees being cut down, and indigenous plants, older flower and vegetable gardens being razed in favour of unnaturally green lawns and exotic shrubs. It gets harder every summer to find blackberries and salmonberries to pick and eat, or to bake into luscious desserts. Parts of the British Properties look positively bare. Beauty is part of what attracts people here, but it is fragile. What is the point of making the Upper Lands look like every other suburb in North America if you take away the views? I do not want to see that happen as it has in so many other places. Fortunately, food gardening and sustainability is catching on in schools. West Vancouver Secondary is offering an urban agriculture credit course this fall with support from Vancouver Coastal Health-North Shore for purchasing an apiary and supporting garden expansion. That is definitely a move in the right direction.

If progress is inevitable, more traffic and fewer common courtesies come with it, or so it seems. A recent trip to the new roundabout at Cross Creek Rd. and Chartwell Dr. showed that while people are appreciative of the effort put into making traffic safer for cars and pedestrians, too many people either don't know, or don't observe, the rules of the road. This issue of *Hilltop News* contains some useful tips for using roundabouts,

but I would also urge that people simply SLOW DOWN and stay off their phones while driving. Unless you are in a true emergency situation, there is little in life that can't wait a few minutes.




The first-ever competitive 5k/8k North Shore Kidney Run was held Sept. 25th at Ambleside Park. The event, which was a part of The Kidney Foundation of Canada's 2011 Kidney Walk campaign, was a huge success, raising close to \$10,000. The goal of the North Shore Kidney Run was to increase awareness of the need for more organ donors, and to encourage participants to be "Kidney Heroes" and save lives by "Closing the Gap" between the 85% of British Columbians who say they believe in organ donation, and the 17% who have actually registered to be organ donors.

The run was sponsored in part by CIBC and featured entertainment by North Vancouver's Freddie Fudpucker and his Rolling Clones band, great food, and a silent auction. Attendees included run honoree and CIBC executive Chris Oullette, and local actress Jessica Parker Kennedy, of *Smallville, The Secret Circle* and *50/50*. Kidney disease has significantly impacted the families of both Chris and Jessica.

Over 200,000+ British Columbians have, or are at risk, of developing kidney disease. Of these, 2,500 are currently on dialysis, with most awaiting or hoping for a new kidney. The wait time is 5-10 years, depending on the patient's blood type. Sadly, many patients can't hang on that long.


Celebrating 80 Years on the Hill

2011 marks the 80th anniversary of the incorporation of British Pacific Properties Limited (BPP) – the company that gave its name to our Upper Lands neighbourhood. Since that time, the history of the company has been intertwined with that of the community.

A brief history of the Properties

The Great Depression threatened the District of West Vancouver, like many other municipalities, with bankruptcy. An answer was found in the person of A.J.T. Taylor, a Victoria engineer turned real estate promoter. In 1931 he convinced Britain's Guinness family to acquire 4,700 acres of the Upper Lands in exchange for a commitment to make \$1 million in improvements over the next five years. Shortly thereafter, the company began construction of the Lions Gate Bridge, which would cost close to \$6 million, and make the North Shore a convenient trip from downtown Vancouver.

The first plans for the British Properties, originally named Capilano Estates, were drawn up in 1933 by the Olmstead Brothers, a renowned Boston firm of landscape architects responsible for such distinctive city landmarks as New York's Central Park and Montreal's Mount Royal Park. An early feature of Capilano Estates was the Capilano Golf and Country Club, which BPP sold to its




members in 1955. In the 1950s, BPP also developed Park Royal, Western Canada's first auto-oriented shopping Centre, to enhance the appeal of moving to new homes in the Properties.

Since then, British Pacific Properties has created neighbourhoods for over 4,500 homes to the west of the original Capilano Estates. These include Westhill, Whitby Estates, Chartwell, and Canterbury. As a group these homes are probably the largest source of the District's tax revenues today.

Community master planning and development continues with Rodgers Creek, a 215-acre series of four new residential neighbourhoods. Still further west in West Vancouver's Upper Lands, construction of a new village centre on the Cypress Bowl access road will help carry British Pacific Properties towards its centennial and beyond.

More recently, in order to better control the quality of design, construction and sustainability, BPP has evolved from a strictly land development company into custom home building. Named British Pacific Homes, this division – one of the largest custom home builders in BC – takes pride in working with some of the top architects in the province, like Creekside Architects, who designed the BPP home that recently won the title of "Best Single Family Home" at the 2010 Urban Development Institute Awards.

Some of the major people who played a vital role in the development and direction of the Properties from the 1980s onward were former Chairman Gerald McGavin and Muriel May. McGavin, who chaired or sat on the board for 27 years, was a successful entrepreneur in his own right. He was an avid philanthropist and influential business leader who assisted many of Vancouver's most prominent arts and cultural organizations. A lifelong rugby enthusiast, he supported Rugby Canada and engineered British Pacific Properties' donation of a full-sized rugby and soccer field above the Upper Levels Highway, which is now under construction and named in his honour. He received the Order of BC in 2006, which is the highest honour the province can extend to its citizens.

May was the public face of British Pacific Properties in the years after the Second World War. She was a remarkable example of post-war female career achievement in this part of the world. Starting off as a single mother with no income, Muriel attended Sprott Shaw College in 1942 by taking a \$100 loan to complete a business course. Her natural flair for sales guided her to real estate, and by 1947, she took over as lead sales representative for BPP where she became known for her witty advertisements and oversized hats.



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90 Years for West Van Baptist

The congregation of West Vancouver is celebrating its 90th anniversary with 90 days of events ending in December with a re-enactment of the once popular Walk to Bethlehem. Residents of the community are welcome to attend.

The church began in 1921 with meetings in the one-room Ambleside Hall at the foot of 14th St.

A building was erected on 15th St and Duchess and in 1924, the church was officially formed with 27 charter members.

The last remaining member of that first congregation, Evelyn Meade (nee Colpitts), passed away earlier this year.

After many additions to the original structure, a new church was built onsite in 1949. The congregation continued to grow and in 1966 the sod was turned for the building of the current church on Mathers near Hadden Drive. With its four panel parabaloid roof and western modernism style, under a forest canopy, the wooden building was soon listed in West Vancouver's book of significant architecture.

"As a resident and parent of students at Sentinel Secondary for the last 10 years I know the problems associated with this intersection...The Roundabout provides students, residents and guests to our neighborhood with safe passage through this busy intersection. The roundabout and improvements also serve as a nice entrance to the neighbourhood," said BPAHA Past President Mary Louise Phinney Tindle.

Rules of the Roundabout

One of the recent traffic safety improvements at Cross Creek Rd. and Chartwell Dr. includes a roundabout. A roundabout is an intersection where traffic flows in a counter-clockwise circle around a centre island.

Benefits of roundabouts

Improved road safety is one of the biggest benefits. Right angle and head-on collisions often cause serious injury when traffic is moving quickly through a normal intersection. Roundabouts provide a safer way because:

• Traffic moves more slowly through the intersection

• There are no left turns in front of oncoming vehicles

• Improved traffic flow: Drivers have fewer stops and delays, since roundabouts do not have stop signs or traffic lights

• Reduced noise and air pollution: Roundabouts improve the quality of life for people living nearby

• Slow-moving traffic makes less noise than traffic that must stop and start, speed up and brake

• Vehicles don't idle at stop signs or traffic lights. Drivers use less gas and fewer idling cars means less exhaust fumes

"How to" for drivers

1. Approach

Reduce your speed

• Watch for signs that may help you find your exit

• Watch for people using the crosswalk, and be ready to stop

2. Yield

• Yield to traffic already in the roundabout coming from your left

3. Enter

• Enter the roundabout to your right (a counter-clockwise direction) when there is a gap in traffic and you feel it is safe

4. Exit

• Never come to a full stop in a roundabout unless traffic conditions require it

• Use your right turn signal to let others know where you plan to exit

• Exit at a slow speed, watching for people using the crosswalk.

If you miss your exit, keep going,

around until you reach it again

"How to" for cyclists & pedestrians

• Cross at marked crosswalks only. You will find them before each road reaches the roundabout

• Use the sidewalk and splitter island to wait for a gap in traffic that allows you time to cross.

- Cross one direction of traffic at a time.
- Never cross through the centre island.
- · Ride your bicycle through the round-
- about as a motor vehicle. Or • Walk your bike across the

crosswalk as a pedestrian.
